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## 1. Welcome address from IUIS President Jorge Kalil

The IUIS President Jorge Kalil welcomed everybody to the 64<sup>th</sup> IUIS Council Meeting.

## 2. Approval of the minutes of 63rd Council Meeting, Medellin, October 13, 2015

The minutes were approved.

## 3. Society review

### 3.a. Executive Committee

#### 3.a.i President's report

The President JK read through his written report ([Appendix 3](#)) going through major IUIS activities during 2015-2016.

#### 3.a.ii Secretary General's report

The Secretary General SM presented his report ([Appendix 4](#)) and informed that he would step down from the SG position for the sake of rotation and rejuvenation of the ExCo. OF raised a question about a need for a "Vice Secretary General" to gain prior experience before becoming SG.

#### 3.a.iii Treasurer's report

The Treasurer NK gave his report ([Appendix 5](#)) and expressed his wish for more IUIS-K.I.T. meetings (e.g. to gain more income to IUIS).

AB mentioned that meetings "in-between" triennial IUIS meetings need to be planned 2 years in advance.

GE pointed out the meeting fatigue because of the existence of too many meetings already.

SM suggested the possibility of alliance with other partners to organize joint meetings.

AB mentioned the need for a "meeting-kit" that IUIS/K.I.T. could provide to those who plan to organize an IUIS meeting. OF reminded that the "kit" concept is used for Keystone symposia.

AM expressed his opinion that many meetings exist, yet more are needed. He called for proposals to arrange IUIS meetings (with the help of an IUIS-meeting "toolkit").

AB provided an example that in Australia there are 7 state meetings in immunology per year with an average of approx. 150 participants in each. Ben Hainsworth (K.I.T.) said that he had been approached about an Australian oncoimmunology meeting.

JK reminded of the IUIS plan about "in-between" meetings that could be organized by "runners-up" of triennial IUIS meeting bidders.

OB asked whether IUIS meetings could be organized annually or biennially?

SM reminded that the triennial periodicity of immunology meetings has been carefully thought about and is the result of natural evolution. Changing it would impose changes to Federation and National meetings, which follow the schedule of ICI/IUIS meetings.

OF asked why Council meeting couldn't be for 1.5 days. JK replied that Council meetings in association with ICI/IUIS Congresses have their main focus in elections, and wider discussion of e.g. Committee affairs occurs during other Council meetings and in additional meetings e.g. with Committee chairpersons.

#### 3.a.iv Past President's address

The Past President SK addressed the Council mentioning the professionalization of IUIS with

the recruitment of K.I.T. in 2014, improvement in finances, links to Frontiers in Immunology journal and the need for further industry sponsoring. A special mention was for the Day of Immunology (DoI) that started as prof. Kaufmann's initiative in EFIS, and later in IUIS. DoI provides general education in immunology to laymen e.g. at schools and content to the press. As a whole DoI has been well received by the public. SK thanked everybody present and the previous president Peter Doherty and organization manager Gerlinde Jahn at the previous IUIS Vienna office in their absence. JK and the Council thanked professor Kaufmann for all his contributions to the Union and wished him well.

### 3.a.v Central Office Review

Sumiko Tanaka from the current IUIS central office (K.I.T. in Berlin) described the role of K.I.T. in the IUIS organization management ([Appendix 6](#)).

### 3.b. Committees

#### 3.b.i. Committee presentations

The attending chairpersons of IUIS committees gave their reports to the Council. The [individual presentations](#) are available at the IUIS website. Additional discussion points are mentioned below.

##### *Clinical Immunology Committee (CIC)*, Reinhold Schmidt

Main activities of CIC have been in organizing courses (often together with EDU). Some discussion was raised about task sharing between ITH and CIC committees. While CIC deals more with clinical immunology, ITH is more focused on cancer immunotherapy. OB mentioned that resources would be available for the cancer therapy area. It was also mentioned that CIC/IUIS could collaborate with other societies in organizing meetings.

##### *Education Committee (EDU)*, Michelle Letarte

Among the many courses organized, the recent courses in South Africa and Tunisia were praised for their very interactive nature and active student participation. Future courses will be organized e.g. in Gambia and Ethiopia. A proposal was made to have chairpersons from both a developing and a developed country in EDU. The EDU Committee was praised for its activity.

##### *Gender equality and career development (GEC)*, Olivera Finn

OF advertised an IUIS-BioLegend lecture to be given by Laurie Glimcher August 24, 2016 and informed about an attempt to get a prize for a woman immunologist for IUIS 2019 (Beijing). The committee is proud of having 3 women candidates in the ballot for the new ExCo. CR raised a concern about the decreasing proportion of men in academic training and wondered whether this will be a problem in the future. NM mentioned the general notion that ~80% of participants in immunological courses are women and asked why they are leaving the field.

##### *Immunotherapy (ITH)*, Chris Rudd

This is a new committee with no IUIS funding yet. CR has prepared itself a mandate with goals. ITH been preparing a joint grant application to ICSU (100,000€ for 3 years) with IUPHAR for immunopharmacology. This would include 3 sections: immune protocols around drug targets, scientific education and natural products. OF asked whether SITC with its 2000 members should be an affiliated member for IUIS. No decision was made.

##### *Nomenclature (NOM)*, Pablo Engel

NOM actually represents a group of subcommittees, coordinated by NOM. Many important discussions have been ongoing in the committee and the need to set up a decision process to approve final nomenclature was raised. In this respect, collaboration with WHO is essential. IUIS provides only seed money for the subcommittees that can receive support from

other sources, as well. JK mentioned that MHC/HLA nomenclature issues (coordinated by Steve Marsh) are currently not under IUIS. JK promised to contact Dr Marsh. PE informed about the problem that the committee no longer, in contrast to the situation during the Milan ICI2013 congress, could publish its nomenclature papers in *Frontiers in immunology* for free.

*Primary immune deficiencies (PID)*, José Luis Franco, PID-EC Secretary

The committee has multiple tasks in the area of PIDs (classification, guidelines for diagnostics and management, awareness and reporting). A new chair for PID, Kathleen Sullivan, was recently appointed. Among its multiple activities PID is setting up a new online database with the help of a company called Curve tomorrow from Australia. A new classification of immune deficiencies has been published in *Clinical Immunology* (230 conditions).

*Quality and Standardisation (QAS)*, (Rudolf Valenta not present) report presented by Sumiko Tanaka

Also for this Committee a new chair, Dr Fatima Ferreira (Salzburg, Austria), has been appointed. QAS has 7 subcommittees. In 2015 a symposium on Standardization of immunological assays was arranged in Vienna. The topics included complement, mAbs, autoantibodies and allergens.

*Vaccination (VAC)*, (Willem Hanekom not present)

No report provided (a new Committee). Willem Hanekom is stepping down as the Chair. Ursula Wiedermann acts as the Vice-Chair for the Committee.

*Veterinary immunology (VIC)*, Gary Entrican

VIC has a wide portfolio of activities. It has participated in veterinary immunology symposia and courses and organized a satellite symposium to ICI2016. VIC is transferring its accounts from US to Sweden. Funding remains an issue, and as search for further funding is ongoing. Because of difficulties to arrange a satellite meeting in China the VIC meeting in 2019 has been decided to be held in the US. This was considered as an exceptional arrangement and a wish that the contact between VIC satellite and the IUIS meeting will be reestablished in subsequent meetings.

### 3.b.ii Roundtable discussion

John Buckeridge from ICSU referred to his association with the International Union of Biological Sciences (IUIBS) and mentioned that IUIBS and IUIS may have common interests in the area of laboratory animals.

OB reiterated that the relationships between ITH and CIC would need to be better defined. CR expressed a wish for more focused committees for IUIS. OF replied that the existing subcommittees are serving this function. JK mentioned the concern that in some situations the subcommittees may be too “far away” and IUIS will not be informed of all their activities. Especially the area of immunotherapy is expanding rapidly and many committees could have related issues under their umbrella.

### 3.c. Member Societies

#### 3.c.i New member for GA vote.

It was informed that the membership of the Malawi Society for Immunology in IUIS will be subjected to a vote in the General Assembly.

### **3.c.ii Member Society Requests**

No issues were raised at this point.

### **3.d. Regional Federations**

#### **3.d.i ALAI, Louis Garcia**

An overview included a report of activities related to ALAI meeting in Medellin (ImmunoColombia), October, 2015 (program, courses, workshops etc.). The next ALAI meeting will be held in Cancun, Mexico in 2018.

Ecuador is a potential new member from the ALAI region. Inquiries will be made to the Central American societies. ALAI also wants to revitalize the immunological societies in Bolivia and Paraguay.

#### **3.d.ii EFIS, René van Lier**

EFIS reported about its ECI2015 meeting in Vienna, September, 2015. The financial situation of EFIS is strong, thanks to income from its journals. The budget ranges between 400-500 k€. Prominent Asteria Prize, short term fellowships, support to meetings (like SEEIS in Montenegro) and many travel grants were provided. *Details can be found at the EFIS report.*

Plans for 2016 include a series of courses and society symposia ("EFIS on tour"). The ECI2018 meeting will be held in Amsterdam instead of Istanbul. The 2018 and 2021 ECI meetings were swapped because of the political unrest in Turkey.

#### **3.d.iii FAIS, Hatem Masmoudi**

FAIS has currently 13 member societies. Mali and Tanzania were recently elected as new members, Malawi is to be voted for by the GA. The Algerian society has expressed a wish to become a member.

Next FAIS meeting will be held in Hammamet, Tunisia, November 3-7, 2017. FAIS/IUIS regional immunology courses are being planned to be held in Kilifi, Kenya, September 19-24, 2016; and Banjul, Gambia, November 19-26, 2016; Ethiopia, 2017 and Hammamet, Tunisia 2017.

#### **3.d.iv FIMSA, Shigeo Koyasu**

The 6th FIMSA Congress with over 600 participants was held in Singapore, 2015. An advanced immunology training course was held in Chandigarh, India, March, 2016.

FIMSA is working for getting new members (Malaysia, Philippines, Indonesia, Vietnam).

### **3.e. Partner Organisations, Affiliates and Sponsors**

#### **3.e.i WHO**

A new liaison from WHO for IUIS, Joachim Hombach in Geneva, has been nominated. SM had agreed to have a meeting with him at the WHO Headquarters in October to discuss the WHO-IUIS relationship in general and issues related to education, vaccination, nomenclature, standardization and publishing.

#### **3.e.ii ICSU**

Gilbert Faure had provided a report. Both him and JK had attended the ICSU meeting in Paris, April, 2016. For example, a joint grant application to ICSU with IUPHAR had been planned (and

delegated to Chris Rudd, see 3.b.i, ITH)).

ICSU Executive Board member, prof. John Buckeridge (also from IUBS), gave a presentation about ICSU and its activities. ICSU has 31 member societies/unions including IUIS. It has regional offices in Pretoria, Kuala Lumpur and San Salvador in connection with respective Academies of Sciences or Ministry of Education (El Salvador).

The mission and functions of ICSU are to generally increase the cohesion and coordination of scientific societies, discuss global issues and launch programs (like Future Earth). ICSU has a Biocluster (unions with interest in bioissues). Joint interests with IUIS include pandemics, the infection health issues and biodiversity. For further details, please see prof. *Buckeridge's presentation*.

### **3.e.iii Other (FOCIS, WAO, ISIR, ISDCI, SMI, ICS)**

No reports or representatives were available from other affiliated societies.

## **4. Activities reviews**

### **4.a. Meetings**

Ben Hainsworth from K.I.T. described the new strategy of triennial IUIS meetings. Instead of having meetings labeled "ICI" in the future IUIS would use a format like "IUIS 2019". This is to indicate that the meetings are organized by IUIS and hosted by a specified host society. The reasons are to generate institutional memory for the meetings, increase the brand of IUIS and to have an economical arrangement, where IUIS has ownership of the meetings and the financial responsibility lies at K.I.T.

#### **4.a.i ICI 2016**

The ICI2016 Congress President José Villadangos provided a report on the forthcoming Congress to be held August 22-28, 2016 in Melbourne. ≈ 4000 participants (3400 paying) are coming from 70 countries. These include 1000 students. Of invited speakers and chairpersons 43% and 55% are women, respectively. 3 press conferences were planned (on zikavirus, allergy and tumor immunotherapy).

The Congress has 77 exhibitors, which is 110% of the target. Sponsorship is 180% of the target. Expected income for IUIS is 294 000 USD. Separately, organized through K.I.T., an income of 120 000 USD (minus costs) to IUIS is expected. The Council congratulated prof. Villadangos and his team for this achievement.

#### **4.a.ii IUIS 2019**

The IUIS 2019 Congress will be held in Beijing, China in April 25-30, 2019. Prof. Zhigang Tian, the President of the CSI and SG of the Steering Committee gave a report on the plans. CSI has 8984 members and its own journal (Cellular and Molecular Immunology, IF 5.193). More than 5000 delegates from China alone are expected to come to IUIS 2019. 500 volunteers will be recruited to assist foreign participants. Steering Committee has been established (Xuetao Cao, AM, Zhigang Tian, JK). Organizing and Scientific Committees will be later set by IUIS in collaboration with CSI.

A promotional 4 minute video about Beijing (CSI and the city of Beijing) and a linked 2 minute video on the preliminary meeting arrangement (K.I.T.) was shown and approved for presentation at the closing ceremony of ICI2016.

#### **4.a.iii IUIS 2022**

The IUIS 2022 Congress bids will be discussed and subjected to voting (point 7).

#### **4.a.iv Regional Congresses**

The wish of IUIS to organize meetings also between the triennial IUIS meetings was stated earlier in the discussions.

#### **4.b Other**

IUIS support to Immunopaedia, an online educational platform organized by Clive Gray, was discussed. A request of 10,000 USD had been made. The Council approved this total amount of support to be included into its budget for 2017 (pending approval by the new Council).

#### **4.b.i Journal**

IUIS has *Frontiers in Immunology* (FIM, published by FMSA, Switzerland) as its official journal. JK described the background for discussion and mentioned that the current contract with FIM is until the end of year 2016, whereby a new contract needs to be negotiated. The financial agreement with the journal, editorial policies and lack of visibility of IUIS in the journal were discussed. The ExCo was planning to have discussions with other potential publishers about a possibility to have a journal owned by IUIS. AM mentioned that the FIM journal had an IF of close to 5.7, considering it as a major achievement. General discussion of journals of different societies (BSI, EFIS) followed. A previously made proposal for an IUIS Publication Committee was reiterated but no decision of its set-up was made. CR suggested to hire a professional negotiator for IUIS.

#### **4.b.ii Day of Immunology**

DoI had been discussed in relation to Prof. Stefan Kaufmann's presentation (point 3.a.iii).

### **5. Bookkeeping/Budget review**

#### **5.a 2015 Audit report**

The IUIS treasurer NK presented the accounts from the year 2015, which had been audited (*see report*). The income from year 2015 (membership fees + journal) was 263,649 USD, and expenses totaled 327,020 USD. After correction for currency differences an appropriated loss of 104,979.66 USD was recorded for 2015. The assets at the end of 2015 (Julius Bär account) were 535,440.72 USD. The Council unanimously approved the financial report for 2015.

#### **5.b 2016 Budget and Budget projection for 2017-2019**

The budget for 2016 and projections for a 3-year period 2017-2019 were presented by NK. An expected income of 432,016 USD and expenditure of 497,620 USD were projected for 2016. The income from ICI2016 was estimated very conservatively as 50,000 USD. For details, please see *Budget 2016-2019* document. Discussion followed about the investment strategies of IUIS and on the Julius Bär account. Until now the strategy has been conservative to secure IUIS from sudden economical losses during turbulent times. CR and AB raised questions about possibilities for more profitable investments. The support for FAIS in 2017 (the year for FAIS meeting) was discussed, and decision on the amount was left for the new Council. AM emphasized that all IUIS accounts and reports (Committees, Federations and IUIS in general) should be transparent and accountable.

The budget was approved under the condition that the Council members will be provided

information about the Julius Bär account.

Decisions on budget projections for 2017-2019 were left for the new Council (to be elected).

## 6. Communications review

### 6.a PUB Committee

The IUIS SG presented plans for a possible Publication Committee (PUB) for IUIS. The tasks of the committee could include discussions and contacts with the publisher about the IUIS journal taking into consideration the interests of IUIS (e.g. brand, economy, editorial policies, IUIS involvement) and general ethical principles in publishing. The primary emphasis in the scientific journal needs to be in having high quality.

Additional functions of PUB could include collaboration with the SG and K.I.T. on publication strategies and contents of the IUIS newsletter, the website and other publication platforms including those providing new educational initiatives. All the many activities e.g. of the Committees and Federations could be presented in the IUIS journal.

John Buckeridge commented that it is important that a Society has ownership for its journal.

### 6.b. 2016-2019 Communications strategy

Sumiko Tanaka presented briefly the strategy for improving communication within IUIS and ways to build traffic to the IUIS website.

## 7. IUIS 2022 Bid selection

### 7.a Society bid presentations

Six bids to organize the IUIS 2022 meeting had been submitted to IUIS within the deadline. Of these, one (Chandigarh, India) was withdrawn, because many ICI or IUIS meetings had already been or will be organized in the FIMSA area (Kobe 2010, Melbourne 2016, Beijing, 2019). 5 societies were each given 15 minutes' time to present their bid in alphabetical order. The following bids were presented:

7.a.i BSI - London

7.a.ii CSI - Toronto

7.a.iii MSI – Mexico City

7.a.iv SAIS – Cape Town

7.a.v SFI - Paris

### 7.b. Council Discussion and voting

JK explained the new principles of organizing IUIS meetings and the background for this: IUIS meeting, not a local society meeting; program discussed jointly between IUIS and local organizers, economic organization through IUIS and its AMC/PCO. The Council discussed the different criteria for making its decision (location, quality of science, finances, local support, accessibility etc.). Zhigang Tian mentioned that the new way to organize the meeting increases focus on science, provides organizational memory from meeting to meeting and reduces the “stress” of local organizers because of a smaller financial burden and responsibility.

The voting instructions according to IUIS Constitution were presented (see agenda). After discussion a voting with secret ballot was carried out. Nine Council members and 5 ExCo members were eligible to vote (total: 14 votes).

The result of the voting was the following: BSI – London, 1 vote; CSI – Toronto, 1 vote;
